Phillip Babb's land grant file #519 was on South branch of Lick Creek (100 A.).

Phillip's land grant file #991 mentions waters of Stocktons Creek and a south branch of Lick Creek (100 A.).

Phillip's land grant file #1243 mentions a branch of Lick Creek (100 A.).

Phillip's land grant file #099 mentions waters of Stocktons Creek and the mouth of Camp Creek (94 A.).

Because creek names often tended to change with the passage of time, and with the changes of residents along the creeks, we need guidance on the locations and names of local watercourses, from knowledgeable Greene County folks. For instance, the tax lists, below, show Seth Babb's land on Dunman's Fork in 1816 but on Tilman's Fork in 1830. Did he move? Or did the name of the fork change?

Since our first sighting of Phillip Babb in Greene County, TN, is on 1 August 1785, two years after the formation of Greene County, it doesn't seem likely that we need to go backward into the records of Washington County, TN. The only mention of Washington County in Phillip's land grants is in the entry of the 100 acres for his land grant file #991, which occurred on 15 February 1779 and is in the name of William Stockton. Phillip wasn't there yet.

We are told that the great movement of people came after the end of the Revolutionary War in 1783; this time frame fits with Phillip's family move to Tennessee from Frederick County, VA. Greene County, TN, Tax Lists

Introduction

Because the land of present Tennessee was originally a part of North Carolina, the earliest state land grants in that area were issued from the Office of the Secretary of State in Raleigh, North Carolina. Those original land grants were transferred several years ago from that office into the North Carolina State Archives and are logged separately from land grants in present North Carolina. I acquired copies of these grants when I was working in the Archives Search Room. These grants have been "retired" and one must use the microfilm, rather than being able to handle the original documents. There are three land grants and one unissued land grant for Phillip Babb in the set of North Carolina land grants in Tennessee. The North Carolina State Archives' Website, MARS, lists no other Babb North Carolina land grants in Tennessee, beyond those shown below for Phillip.

Land grants were issued in the order in which the applications were received, so the lower numbered grants were acquired first.

Greene County was formed in 1783 from Washington County. Washington County was formed in 1777 from Rowan County, NC. In December 1789, North Carolina ceded its Tennessee lands to the U. S. for the second time, the first ceding having happened in April 1784. The state of Tennessee was admitted to the union in 1796, as the 16th state.

There were four steps in the process of acquiring a North Carolina land grant (or patent). They were: 1) ENTRY - the person wishing to own the land went to the county Entry Taker and described for him the acreage desired, naming watercourses on the land, neighbors adjoining the land, and any unusual features of the topography of the land; 2) WARRANT - the county Entry Taker issued a paper warrant to the County Surveyor, to go to the land and survey the land; 3)

SURVEY - the County Surveyor, or one of his deputies, went to the land and, with the assistance of men of the family or neighbors, surveyed the land, writing a description and platting the tract; and 4) GRANT - if all the papers were in order, all fees paid, and there were no caveats (other claims) to the land, the grant issued from the Office of the Secretary of State in Raleigh, NC. The new owner had a prescribed amount of time in which to take the grant to the county court house to have it recorded. A land grant for previously-unowned land was a primary deed.

Land Grant File No. 519

Phillip Babb - 100 acres on South branch of Lick Creek. Entered (date not given); issued 20 September 1787. The warrant number is not given. "There were no documents in this shuck at time of filming." [The shuck is the long, tall legal envelope that holds all of the documents associated with a land grant. This envelope was empty, so all we know about it is the information written on the outside of the shuck.]

Land Grant File No. 991

Phillip Babb - 100 acres on the waters of Stocktons Creek. Entered 15 December 1779, but warrant for survey is dated 15 February 1779, Washington County, NC (now Tennessee) and is issued in the name of William Stockton. Stockton signed over his warrant, #1212, for 100 acres on a south branch of Lick Creek, to Phillip Babb on 1 August 1785, the earliest-found sighting of Phillip in that area, and the warrant was issued to the surveyor of Green County. However, this is Phillip's second grant, so he may have been in Washington/Greene County prior to this time. We don't know when he arrived. The grant issued 29 July 1793. The chain carriers for the survey are not given.

Phillip Babb's 100 acres adjoined Charles Armstrong. The metes and bounds of the land are: "Beginning at a shugar tree thence South One hundred poles to a Stake Armstrongs line thence East thirty poles to a stake at the foot of the Mountain thence North thirty nine poles East three Hundred & twenty One poles Along the side of the Mountain to a Stake on William Stocktons line of the Survy of 300 Acres thence South fifty six West 200 Hundred & Seventy six poles Along the line of the Survey of 300 Acres to the Beginning." The tract is a nearly-triangular one, abutting the mountain. [Original spelling and punctuation have been retained.]

Land Grant File No. 1243

Phillip Babb - 100 acres on a branch of Lick Creek. Entered 6 October 1779; surveyed 20 June 1785 by virtue of a double warrant [meaning unknown to this writer]; issued 12 January 1793. Warrant #1869 was originally issued to Mary Culberson [information courtesy of MARS Catalog on the NC State Archives Website].

Description of land: "Beginning at a black oak on d [said] Babbs Corner thence South fifty six west sixty seven poles to a stake along Sd Babb's Line thence South fourteen poles to a beach thence East eighteen poles to a stake thence South Seventy fore poles to two Dogwood thence East Sixty poles to a stake thence North one Hundred & forty poles to a black oak thence East Sixty three poles along Gillaspia line to two Sowerwoods thence North Sixty poles to a hickory thence west one Hundred and thirty Nine poles to the Beginning." John Snider and Jonathan Humber were chain carriers for the survey. I am unable to identify John Snider, but Jonathan Humbert was the husband of Mary, younger sister of Stephen and Phoebe Babb (see below). [The tract is a very irregular one, the outline of which reminds one of the appearance of an upright hatchet.] This grant adjoined his first grant (#519).

Unissued Land Grant File No. 09

Phillip Babb - [any grant beginning with a "0" is an unissued grant] - 94 acres on waters of Stocktons Creek. It was entered 27 November 1779, but not by Phillip. Warrant for survey, No. 2292, of the same date as entry, was for 100 acres and was originally issued in the name of Abraham Kirkindall, who transferred it to James Kirkindall [sometimes Kuykendall], 23 Feb

1789. The land was on Camp Creek near the mouth including a Tree marked with A and a Flower ? . While one hundred acres had been entered, when the land was surveyed, it was found to contain but 94 acres. It occasionally happened that there was not quite as much land available as had originally been predicted; sometimes there was a bit more.

The land was surveyed on 5 March 1789. The description of the land: "Beginning a Red oak & shugar tree thence West along Sd Babbs Line Seventy Eight pole to a pine thence South Seventy pole along Kings Line to a Buckeye thence West fifty pole to a Red oak thence South Eighteen poles to a dogwood and hickory thence West sixteen poles to a hickory and Chesnut oak thence South one hundred and forty poles to a white oak and hickory thence East thirty poles to a poplar and from thence Direct Course to the Beginning."

Chain carriers for the survey were Stephen Babb, son of Phillip, and William Ford, husband of Stephen's next-younger sister Phoebe (see Jean A. Sargent's Babb Families of America, Second Edition, p. 52). [It is unknown why the grant did not issue; perhaps Phillip Babb had a change of heart and sold his right to someone else.]

Comment on Land Warrants

In the cases of three of Phillip's four attempts at land grant ownership, above, he was not the person who originally entered the land. We don't know about the fourth. Instead, he purchased the warrants from others. Because there was continuous movement of the settlers, entering land was like having "money in the bank", for the warrant-holder could make a profit from the sale of warrants for desirable land. It was a speculative move.

About Your Author

Your submitter is a descendant of Seth Babb's daughter Mary "Polly" Babb, who married Nathan Hoggatt/Hockett in 1820 and removed to Clinton County, Ohio. Unfortunately this line is not developed in Jean Sargent's book, Babb Families of America, beyond that marriage (see page 60), but I knew my lineage back to that marriage. You cannot imagine my surprise when I was able to link back to the very first Babb in this country, thanks to Jean's work - for my father was unaware of any Babb ancestry. Phillip Babb of this discussion is my fifth great grandfather. My late husband and I have lived in Burke County in western North Carolina for fifty-six years; our two children, and four of our five grandchildren, were born here. I have done genealogical research for our family since 1964 and for paying clients since 1985. I have contributed articles to our local genealogical society journal for thirty years and am an honorary life member of the Burke County Genealogical Society. In October 2005, I received the Historian of the Year - West - Award by the North Carolina Society of Historians, and in 2012 the North Carolina Genealogical Society gave me the award for "Outstanding Contribution to North Carolina Genealogy".

Greene County History

The area covered by Greene County is referred to in the deeds herein at various times as Greene County, NC, part of the State of Franklin, Washington Co, TN, and Greene Co, Territory South of the Ohio, as well as Greene Co, TN.

Greene County was formed by North Carolina in April 1783 out of part of the Washington District, which had itself been formed in 1777. Part of Greene County went into Knox County in 1792, and part of it was put into present Jefferson County the same year.

Be sure to check the PLACE INDEX for references to neighbors and proximity to streams. Also listed is a wealth of information concerning places from which the settlers came. I have tried to include all information given regarding the listing of slaves in Mortgages, Bills of Sale, Gift Deed, etc. Look under the separate SLAVE INDEX for the names of such persons.

I am grateful to the Tennessee State Library for providing the microfilm from which I worked. I have tried to read accurately the many names in the handwritten documents, checking my interpretations when possible by the names listed in books such as NORTH CAROLINA LAND GRANTS RECORDED IN GREENE COUNTY, TENNESSEE, and GREENE COUNTY, TENNESSEE MINUTES OF THE COURT OF COMMON PLEAS, 1783-1795, both by Burgner, and EARLY TENNESSEE TAX LISTS, by Sistler.

The NAME INDEX lists the full names if given in the document, and where only the last name is given (as referring to a neighbor's land), that is also given, so that a valuable connection will not be missed by the genealogist. I have usually not listed more than one time the names of Clerks, Surveyors, Judges and other officials.

Bio:

He grew up in Frederick Co., VA, where his grandfather had given his father land.

The second marriage was in 1803 when Philip was 60-70 years old and Nancy was past 50, according to the recollections of her daughter Mary Antrim, b. 1794. Philip was so excited by the marriage that he jumped over fences like a young colt, but the Antrim step-children were not happy about the relationship and started moving to OH. However, in his will of 6 Jan 1813 Philip gave to each of his children \$1.00 over and above what they had had bestowed on them, and stated that his personal property was to be divided between step-son Robert Antrim and step son-in-law Jesse Davis, who were to be Executors (Jesse was husband of Sarah Antrim).

Philip moved to Greene Co., TN ca 1787 and located near present Greenville where he erected a mill for grinding wheat and corn, known as "Babb's Mill." The mill burned a few years later, and was in time rebuilt by his son Philip, Jr. Philip also had a sawmill. The building still stands today, although clapboarded over probable logs, and somewhat dilapidated.

A Philip Babb is on the 1805 and 1812 tax lists for Greene Co. Son Philip, Jr., is also on the

1812, tax list, and sons Seth and Thomas are on the 1805 and 1812 tax lists. After Philip's death in 1813, his son Philip became Senior and had a son Philip who was Jr., and this has led to confusion, since Philip did not name his children in his will. What we do have are records of the Hopewell Monthly Meeting which give births for children Sarah, Joseph, and Thomas. Then son Seth gave his birth date in his pension papers; in addition he was disowned by the Quakers in 1779 along with his mother Mary and sister Phoebe for joining the Methodists. Then in 1784 the Quaker records show a request of Philip Babb's children Philip, Stephen, Mary, Elizabeth and Tamar for a certificate to New Garden, NC MM. The next month (10th) the Friends of New Garden stated they were not willing to accept the above children. Then we find an item from Russell Emery's "Babb Family Bulletin" Vol. #1-1 of Mar 1967 that was a recommendation that Philip had sent from Frederick Co., VA to North Carolina in 1787. (He purchased land in 1785 in Greene Co. so it appears that it was sent after the fact.):

"Frederick Co., Virginia. To all Whome it May consarn. We whose names are under written do Certify-that Philip Babb and his family, has lived in this County for a Number of years and hath behaved them Selves as Peaceable People with their Nibours and honest in their dealings with all men as far as we know or believe until they moved them Selves to North Carolina to witness where of we have hereunto set our Names this 14 Day of July 1787. Signed by: (18 neighbors including brother Peter Babb.) ,t [Note that the area they moved to was originally part of NC known as Greene Co., from Washington Co. in 1783, named in honor of Nathaniel Greene, Washington's right-hand man who had saved North Carolina from the British in Battle of Guilford Court House. It was ceded to the Federal Gov't, then became part of a state called Franklin, 1784-1788, then in 1790 created by U.S. Govt. as "Territory of the United States South of the River Ohio" - or Southwest Territory; then in 1796 became part of the new State of Tennessee.]

Meanwhile in 1790, 7th month, 5th day, the Hopewell MM records of VA state: "This meeting is informed that Philip Babb's children - Philip, Stephen, Mary, Elizabeth, and Tamar removed with their parents within the verge of Westfld M. M. in North Carolina and had no certificates and several of them since gone out in marriage. Richard Ridgway and James Steer are appointed to write to that meeting requesting their assistance in treating with those who have misconducted, also some information concerning the others and report when ready." Thus we have pulled together children of Philip and separated them from those of Philip.

They moved to Bethel Township, Chester (Now Delaware) Co., PA, where he had purchased land, and it is believed that their first two children were born.

In Nov 1735 Thomas received a Patent to 600 acres of land on Applepie Ridge in Frederick Co., VA, near Winchester. Under the conditions of the Patent, the land had to be occupied, three acres of every fifty cleared and cultivated, and certain yearly payments made to an agent of the King. Thomas chose his sons Thomas, Jr., and Philip to carry out the provisions of the Patent.

Thomas was a Quaker, as was his father, and on 3, 1, 1736 his certificate of Membership was transferred from the Kennett Monthly Meeting to the Hopewell MM, of which Thomas was one of the founding fathers. It was located near Winchester, VA.

There is a will written by Stephen Babb dated 17 Jun 1760, in which he named his father Thomas Babb, as Executor. The will was probated 7 Oct 1760, and the court stated that the designated Executor was already dead. In addition, there is a will written by Thomas dated 22 Sep 1760 which does not list Stephen as one of the children. It appears that both Thomas and son Stephen were alive on 17 Jun 1760, and that Stephen died between that date and 22 Sep of that same year when Thomas wrote his will. Thomas in turn died between the writing of his will on 22 Sep and the probating of Stephen's will on 7 Oct 1760. Sarah is not mentioned in either will and is believed to have died by 17 Jun. Thomas left the home plantation to youngest son Sampson; however, we have no record that Sampson married.

Peter is named as a son-in-law in Henry Bowen's will of 8 May 1778 and is a co-Executor.

The inventory of Peter's estate includes a still, a "Syder" mill, 33 gals brandy, 18-day clock, money scales, silver watch, several books, etc. In his will dated 21 Feb 1817 he named his four sons and three daus. (Two other daus had died by then.)

In Peter's will proved 4 Dec 1820 in Frederick Co., VA, he indicated that son

Samson's heirs should have money left from sale of land to Bingley Mason, son Henry should not have any more land as he had sold the tract of land that Peter had already given him, heirs of son Abner deceased were devised a tract of 325 acres on waters of Isaacs Creek, son Peter should not have any more land as he had already been given land in Ohio, son David should not have any more land as he had sold the tract already given him and had received the money. The lot of land whereon he then lived was to be sold separate and the money divided equally among his 3 daughters. The old place was to be sold and the money arising was to be divided among all his children and grandchildren of those deceased, The daughters were bequeathed three ginues a peace, and the sons were to divide up his wearing apparel. His friend John Bowen was named Executor.

Diana has tentatively been placed as a daughter of Thomas Babb Jr. Her daughter dies in Greene County, TN. Due to her age, she could have only been the sister of Philip Babb the original Babb settler in Greene County, TN.

The move to Greene County, all happened at one point in history and only close family members were brought along. Thus she would have been in the inner orbit of Philip. It is believed that her omission prior to this date is due to the coincidence of history that women's names were rarely recorded.

We have a handwritten note from approximately 1940 that shows John B Webb's ancestry. The original will be posted as part of the documentation for Diana. Corroborating evidence appears scarce, but is being sought.

Some evidence that is available is the immigration record of her husband's daughter to the US in 1753 arriving in Philadelphia, PA. This document is also included in her records.

Notes for Joseph Edwin Babb:

Joseph Babb, son of Thomas and Sarah (Foulk), b. ca 1740, in Frederick Co., VA, where his parents had migrated from Chester Co., PA in 1736. Their certificate of Quaker membership was transferred to Hopewell MM 3,1, 1736, and Thomas was one of the founding fathers. Joseph mar. Mary McCool 17 Sep 1761, who was daughter of James and Ann (Wright) McCool; James had come from Ireland in 1725. Mary was b. 1844, and was a widow in 1781 when she supplied material aid such as beef, bacon, rations for 40 men, forage and 150 bushels of grains for soldiers in the Revolution. It is believed that Joseph died in 1780, but he did not leave a will.

Joseph was disowned by the Quakers for "marrying out of unity" which indicates that his wife was not a Quaker at that time. Joseph and Mary lived in VA until after the birth of their third son. Around 1766/7 they decided to move to what was then the 96th District of Berkeley Co., SC, along with his first cousins MERCER Babb and Margaret Babb WADLINGTON and their families. On 24 Nov 1767 Joseph was given a grant of 250 acres "on Beaver Dam Branch, Berkeley County, SC, bounded on the SE by land of Pennington, on all other sides by vacant lands." In 1785 this area became Laurens County, and the name Berkeley Co. was given elsewhere.

On 3 Jul 1768 Mary was given a certificate of membership in the Bush River MM. The meeting house was situated about four miles east of what is now the Newberry-Laurens County line. Later, on 28 Apr 1792, Mary was disowned by the Quakers for "quarreling." On 18 Oct 1768, Joseph and wife Mary deeded his part of the original 600 acres granted to his father Thomas in 1754, to his brother Peter Babb of Frederick Co., VA; and it was recorded in Deed Bk 12, p. 535. Peter remained on the land and became a Captain in the Revolution [1-2-2-2].

On 9 Sep 1788 Mary Babb, as Executor of the last will and testament of Joseph Babb, dec. [no record of this will] nominated friend Peter Tubb as her attorney "to settle all the accounts of her late husband with John Mariss, Exec. of the estate of John W. Cool, Dec., of the State of Pennsylvania and with John Antrum and all other persons that may have any concern with the aforesaid accounts..."

Mary was disowned by the Quakers of Bush River MM for "quarreling," many years after she first joined.

Mary (McCool) Babb mar. 2nd Eldridge Fuller, and in Deed Bk G, p. 528 dtd 13 Nov 1802, there is a statement from Eldridge to Thomas Babb his attorney, "I do hereby authorize you said Thomas Babb to pay over rent and residue and remaining part of my said estate in my said attorney's hands to your mother, Mary FULLER, formerly Mary Babb, for her separate use and maintenance therewith as is most agreeable to herself." Since Mary Babb was listed as head of household on the 1790 Census with one male over 16, 3 males under 16, and 2 other females. she remarried between then and 1802.

Mary died by 3 Jun 1816 and there are probate records of settlement of her estate dated 16 Nov 1818, with son-in-law James Culbertson as Administrator. Legatees were ABNER, Thomas, SAMPSON, Joseph, Daniel Fuller husband of POLLY Babb, James Culbertson husband of Nancy, and each was to receive \$54.86. Son James was not included in the estate. He had sold land to Mother Mary in 1806, and had left SC and gone to Tennessee - perhaps she disowned him!

ABNER Babb, as the oldest son and heir of Joseph Babb, prepared an indenture dtd 13 May 1794 between himself and wife Martha and his brother Joseph and his heirs, and in consideration of Ten shillings, granted Joseph 293 acres of land including the 200 acres originally granted to father Joseph in 1767, plus 150 acres conveyed to father Joseph by William Wright in 1772. Brother Joseph was to at all times forever hereafter peaceably and quietly enter into, have, hold, use and enjoy the said tract of 293 1/2 acres. Witnesses were John Stanfield, James Culbertson, and James Babb.

Notes for Stephen Babb:

Mary Malin was b. ca 1734 and has been mistakenly sometimes named as first wife of Stephen's brother Peter - who actually married only Mary Bowen. Stephen had a short married life with Mary as he decided to make out his will 17 Jun 1760 and died by the 7 Oct 1760 date of probate. As explained in the March 1990 issue of Babb Family Association News and Notes, brother Peter was disowned by the Quakers for "Marrying contrary to discipline" as Mary Bowen was not a Quaker. The MM committee had been trying to make an official complaint against him for attending a marriage consummated contrary to discipline and for singing and dancing at brother Joseph's wedding 17 Sep 1761, but his marriage gave them a more quickly decided reason for discipline. Brother Joseph was then disowned for "marrying out of unit" since Mary McCool was not a Quaker. Brother Stephen was not disowned, as he didn't live long enough to attend the weddings.

Widow Mary Malin Babb was footloose and fancy free, and may have done some playing around. She soon attached herself to Mercer Beeson, who had been disowned by the Monthly Meeting at Nottingham, PA, for the accusation of fathering a bastard, which he denied. So he moved to VA with relatives and his records went to Hopewell MM where he was again disowned. Like a moth to the fire he was attracted to widow Mary. Testimony was read against her on 2nd day 3rd mo (May) 1761 as follows:

"Whereas Mary Babb formerly Malin hath had her education and made profession of the Christian Religion as it is held and believed in by the People called Quakers but she the said Mary through unwatchfulness and for want of taking hold to that unerring guide that Leads out of all error hath

for some time past suffered her Self to keep company with men not of our Society which brought uneasiness. on Friends who laboured with her for her Recovery but she obstinately refused to make satisfaction and whilst under Dealings for the same hath gone out in marriage with a young man that belonged not our Society notwithstanding she was timely precautions and there being other scandalous Reports prevailing against her which she dont seem able to clear her self of although Friends have taken due pains to hear Her Defence by a Committy appointed for that purpose and Friends having Discharged their duty in dealing with Her and still finding her not to be in Disposition of Mind capable to make satisfaction for her misconduct: Therefore we can do no Less for the Clearing of Truth than Testify against Her the said Mary Babb and have no unity with her as a member of our Society hereby disowning her untill she come to a sight of her outgoings and obtain Repentance for the same which that she may is desired on Her behalf. Signed and by order of our Monthly Meeting of Hopewell held the 2nd day of 3rd mo 1761, by William Jolliffe, Clark, Sarah Pickering , Clark"

Stephen had left his entire estate to his wife Mary Malin Babb, and she presumably was able to take the proceeds with her in the second marriage. Mary and Mercer moved on to Mason Co., KY, and Mary was named in her Mother's will of 1798 as "Mary Beeson."

Notes for Thomas Babb Sr:

In the Newark Monthly Meeting Records there is an entry dated 3 Oct 1713 which reads as follows; "Thomas Babb appearing at this meeting and gives ye meeting to understand yt ye death of his wife and for want of some persons to whom he might leave ye care of his young children hath hitherto been ye lett of his not coming more frequent to ye meetings of business." While there are early entries concerning Bathsheba, none of them mention the birth of her children or the date of her marriage. Since Thomas did not marry 2nd until 1720, he ran a single parent household with resulting problems. A couple of his children were written up in Quaker records for not following the rules!

Thomas would have been about age 7 when his father died (if b. 1664" as we estimate). In April 1675 he was indentured until the age of 18 to Henry Green of Hampton, NH "as a child who was living with him" ("Geneo. Dict. of Maine and New Hampshire" by Noyes/Libby/ Davis). Thomas would have met the Hussey and Perkins families in Hampton, but no date and place of his marriage is known. Thomas and brother William were taxed in Salem, MA in 1683 ("History of Salem, MA" by Perley). Also William Babb & Co. had an account with Philip English, a merchant of Salem, to 1684 "To Goods sold them to carry to the Southward" ("Geneo. Dict. of Maine and New Hampshire" by Noyes/Libby/ Davis).

Bathsheba's father, John Hussey, and uncle Stephen Hussey, became Quakers, and found it desirable to leave the NH area because of persecution of Quakers there. Stephen moved to Nantucket Island, and John and his wife continued down the coast to New Castle County, Delaware, noted for being tolerant. On 1 Jul 1695 John Hussey was conveyed land and Plantation at Christina from Charles Rumsey; on 6 Aug 1695 he was conveyed the other Pt. of the above Plantation of 300 acres from John Richardson. (Records of the Court of New Castle, DE, Vol. II, 1681-1699)

Thomas Babb apparently followed close behind Hussey, because on 17 Dec 1695 he was conveyed 100 acres of land and 20 acres of "mash" in Rocklands by Timothy Atkinson (Ibid.)

Thomas and Bathsheba had 7 known children, but we can only approximate their birthdates. The order given below is that shown in the will of Thomas, but since it lists all the males first and then the females, it may reflect the policy of the times and not the true age relationships.

Thomas prospered in DE and had sizeable land holdings as shown in the early land records (DE Land Records). In 1735 he obtained a Patent to 600 acres of land in Frederick Co., VA. By this time his three sons had moved to Chester Co., PA, just across the state line from their former home in DE. Thomas sent the two younger sons Thomas, Jr., and Philip to occupy the 600 acres in VA and to carry out the other provisions of the Patent (Records of Robert E. Babb, Jr., late of Charleston, SC).

In his will, dated 17 Aug 1748 and proved 13 Aug 1751, Thomas bequeathed the home place in DE to his oldest son Peter, and left the VA lands to sons Thomas, Jr., and Philip. He made other bequests to his daughters Mary, Rebecca, and Lydia, as well as to three children of his deceased daughter Hulda -- John, Rebecca, and Lydia Gregory (New Castle Co., Probate Records).

In a 1758 election in Frederick Co., VA, among those voting for George Washington for the VA House of Burgesses were: Philip Babb, Thomas Babb (son of PHIL.), Thomas. Babb, Peter Babb, Joseph Babb, and Thomas. Babb, Jr (Virginia Historical Magazine, 1899 p. 163).

In the Newark Monthly Meeting Records there is an entry dated 3 Oct 1713 which reads as follows; "Thomas Babb appearing at this meeting and gives ye meeting to understand yt ye death of his wife and for want of some persons to whom he might leave ye care of his young children hath hitherto been ye lett of his not coming more frequent to ye meetings of business." While there are early entries concerning Bathsheba, none of them mention the birth of her children or the date of her marriage. Since Thomas did not marry 2nd until 1720, he ran a single parent household with resulting problems. A couple of his children were written up in Quaker records for not following the rules!

Philip was disciplined by the Quakers for having married contrary to discipline. At the 5 May 1737 Monthly Meeting the following testimony given at the previous M. M. by Phillip Babb was read according to order:

"To the MM of Newark held at ye center the first of ye second month 1738, Whereas I was brought up and educated in the principles of truth as it is professed by us as a people, but for want of haveing a due regard to devine assistance have lett out my effections on a woman not of our Society and accomplished my marriage by the priest contrary to my parents advice thereby haveing given ocaion for the way of truth to be evel spoken of-for which offence against God, and disobadience to my parent and offence agains I am sorrey, and desire that the Lord may forgive me-and that Friends may continue me under their care, and I hope to be more watchful for the futer as witness my hand.

Signed Phillip Babb"

It is believed that Margaret Mercer was sister of the Edward Mercer of Berkeley, WV, and was a Presbyterian. Ruth Harrington, a descendant, indicates that there was another Edward Mercer who d. 1763 in Frederick Co., VA and whose land was near Babb land, but was perhaps not the father of Margaret. In the 8 Oct 1781 will of Edward of Berkeley Co., he names a daughter Margaret and a daughter Blanch, who is presumably the Blanch who mar. son Thomas of Philip and Margaret. Ruth has also discovered that the wife of Edward Mercer was Mary Lemen (Lemon) whose brother James mar. a Lucy Chapman. Mary signed an affidavit after the death of Gilead Chapman 1783 revealing her maiden name.

It should be noted that in later life Phillip signed his name Philip. Perhaps as a result of "discipline" by the Quakers, brothers Philip, Peter, and Thomas moved across the DE state line to Chester Co., PA, where they made their homes for a while, and Philip transferred from Newark MM to Kennett MM in Chester Co. Apparently his Quaker membership did get reactivated. In 1735 Thomas was given a Patent to 600 acres of land in Frederick Co., on Applepie Ridge, NW of Winchester.

Philip and brother Thomas were told by their father to move to VA and manage the land and to carry out the requirements of the Patent. Philip was granted certificate of transfer on 1748, 3, 6 from the Kennett MM to the Hopewell MM. Brother Thomas was a founder of this Meeting in VA. (Hopewell MM rec.) Philip also held 117 acres on the side of Babb Mountain which he had acquired by a Patent 8 Apr 1760. Philip is shown on the Rent Rolls, paying for the use of the land in 1759 and 1764. (Order Bk 12, Dec 1764) Philip's will dated 6 Mar 1762 and probated 7 Apr 1762, was recorded in Bk 3, pp. 42-3, Frederick Co., VA. He bequeathed to his wife Margret, oldest son Thomas, oldest daughter Jane Reeves, youngest daughter Margret Babb and youngest son Mercer. Son Thomas had been given part of the plantation in 1761, and wife Margret was to have the part of the Plantation called the Great Marsh. Son Thomas was to drive her wagon and team at her pleasure. The daughters were to receive money, and son Mercer was to receive the house and lott after his mother's decease [Note: Later records show spelling Margaret despite spelling in will].

Phillip's Marriage in Dartmouth, Devon and Life and Family in Limehouse, London, England

Phillip was married to Marie Plumlie (Plumleigh) in Dartmouth, Devon, England. He never seemed to make it his home and instead took his bride to London where he was likely raised and where his immediate family lived. Together they had 2 sons who died young and a daughter named Mary for which no additional records have been located. In 1645 Marie/Mary testifies in a matter involving her maiden family and both she and Phillip are still living at this moment. Seven years later he is found on the Isles of Shoals having emigrated to America. The Isles were "no place for women" at that time. His wife might have stayed on the mainland or may have passed away by then.

Background on the Isles of Shoals

The Shoalers for many years ruled themselves by ship command, as they chose to be very independent and were seldom bothered by mainland politics. The ownership of the isles first came under the patent to the Plymouth Company in 1606 under the command of Sir Ferdinando Gorges. Then in 1620 Gorges formed a partnership with John Mason who had resigned as Governor of Newfoundland to help colonize New England. Gorges and Mason ruled as absentee landlords from England and did not interfere with the fishing, which they considered important. In 1623 Mason and Gorges got a patent from the Plymouth Company for all territory between the Merrimac and Kennebec Rivers, calling it the "Province of Maine." In the same year the Plymouth Council appointed Robert Gorges Governor of all New England, and his first administrative duty was to collect a tax of five pounds for every thirty tons of shipping in New England ports. The fishermen of the isles objected so strenuously that Gorges gave up and returned to England and soon died, along with the tax measure.

If the early fishermen had wives, they did not bring them on their ships because of superstition. But Mason and Gorges inspired young unmarried men to seek their fortunes in New England, and some came to the Shoals. This apparently brought up the question of wives, and a court order was issued from somewhere forbidding women to reside at the Shoals. This did not come to a head in the records until 1647 when a John Renolds and a William Wormwood brought their wives to the isles. In 1650 Wormwood appealed to the Court at Gorgeana (York, ME) that the Act against women be repealed, and it was found that the Act had become obsolete before 1635!

The Man

Into this independent atmosphere young Phillip Babb appeared on Hog Island by November 1652 when his name first appears on record there. He was probably at least a mature 18 or a little older, and he was very likely single -- one of those bright young men that Gorges and Mason and perhaps his relatives had inspired to come to the New World.

Kittery in the Province of Maine was the closest landfall to the Isles, and Alexander Shapleigh from Kittery Point in England built the first house there in 1635. However, the first indication that it had developed into a town was a record of a town meeting held 19 Mar 1648. There is a court record dated 16 Oct 1649 which states: "It is ordered by this Court and the power thereof that the Inhabitants of Pascataquack within the jurisdiction of this province had the full power of a township as any other towns within this jurisdiction have, and that all the inhabitants from Brabote Harbor and so eight miles above Newichawanocke with the Isles of Shoales to be within that township³, 8." This, of course, made the Isles of Shoals part of the town of Kittery for the time being.

Self Governance

In 1652 three Massachusetts men were appointed Commissioners to treat with the people of Maine, and to get them to acknowledge the jurisdiction of Massachusetts. This first group failed, and a second group was appointed composed of Simon Bradstreet, Samuel Symonds, Thomas Wiggin (of Dover), and Brian Pendleton (of Great Island, Newcastle). They summoned the men of Kittery to appear at the home of William Everet on 16 November. After some debate thirty-four of them signed the agreement drawn up by the Commissioners -- half signed their full names and half made their marks with a clerk adding their first and last names. The original, about six by eight inches, is in the Massachusetts Archives. Phillip Babb's name is not on this copy.

The report of the Commissioners to the General Court at Boston is in a clerk's handwriting, with

the names arranged in different order and seven names added including that of Phillip Babb. Apparently in the intervening 4 days before the final report the seven were convinced that they should concur. The signatures are by the clerk.

The four Commissioners had the powers of a civil and criminal court and on 20 Nov 1652 they issued a grant with 14 conditions which made Kittery a Township in the new County of York of Massachusetts. The first, seventh, and ninth conditions are particularly important in relation to Phillip Babb:

1. That the wholl tract of land beyond the river of Piscataq northerly together with the Ile or Ile's of Soles, within our said Bounds is and shall be henceforth a County, or Shire, by the name of Yorkshire.

7. That all the present Inhabitants of Kittery shall be freemen, and of ye Country: and having taken the oath of freemen shall have libty to give their votes for ye elecon of ye Governour, Assistants, and other gen'all officers of ye Country.

9. That every Township shall have three men approved by the County Court to end small causes as other townships in the Jurisdiction hath where noe Magistrates or Commission resideth.

Article 7 admitted all the inhabitants of Kittery as "Freemen," although they were not church members because there was no organized church in Kittery until later. In Massachusetts one had to be accepted as a church member to be authorized to take the Freeman's Oath. However, the authorities were making an exception for the Province of Maine in the interests of gaining control of the area³, 8. [Becoming a Freeman in Massachusetts was not a condition of serving some years as an English prisoner in the colonies as was often true in southern states.]

In connection with Article 9, the Commissioners appointed Phillip Babb as Constable for the Isles of Shoals on 24 Nov 1652. A constable in those days assisted in preserving order and collecting taxes.

On 18 May 1653 twenty of the Shoalers, including Phillip Babb signed the first of three petitions to the Massachusetts Court to plead for local government on the Isles, including a separate Court and a distinct company of militia. In response to the 1653 petition for a township, the Court did not agree, but did "think meete that the petitioners be granted liberty of determining Civil actions which shall concern them, where either one or both part yes are inhabitants & taken there to the valew of ten pounds." Mr. Brian Pendleton, Mr. Nicholas Shapley, Hercules Hunkins, Richard Seely & Phillip Babb were commissioned for such cases. They or any three of them which must include Mr. Pendleton or Mr. Shapley were to determine all such cases legally brought before them according to law until the court took further action⁹. Thus, Phillip Babb became a local magistrate, and apparently retained the office for the rest of his life⁴.

Also under the same date of 18 May 1653, there is an original document in the MA Archives which is a petition of the Inhabitants of Piscataqua [the area around the entrance to the Piscataqua River which included Dover, Kittery and Strawberry Banks - present Portsmouth] and the Isles of Shoals. Addressed "To the much honored General Court at Boston - - - The humble Remonstrance of the Inhabitants in Piscataqua and ye Isles of Showls". It is a request for assistance in the defense of the area, with the agreement that they will share part of the charges according to their abilities, with all submission to the court's mature deliberations.

The importance of the document to us is that the eight signatures appear to be originals, each in a different handwriting, and therefore this is the only true signature of our Phillip Babb that we have found. The signatures are:

For Strawberry Banks	Brian Pendleton, Richard Cutts

The only other indication of Phillip's signing a document is a deed of Thomas Onyon signed by witnesses on 8 Jun 1660, when Phillip Babb signed his mark "P", so we assume he chose not to

write his whole name at this later date, and perhaps had an injured hand. [York Deeds Book III, fol. 119]

On 30 Jun 1653 the York County records reported the sad story of Stephen Ford who had survived a violent storm, but his arms and legs were so badly frozen that part of them rotten off, and he was incapable of using them to make a living. The inhabitants of the Isles of Shoals out of their charitable minds and good will contributed 56 pounds or thereabouts for his subsistence. The court ordered Capt. Brian Pendleton and Phillip Babb to receive the money and improve the same -- and give security to Capt. Nicho. Shapleigh and Mr. Edw. Rishworth. Out of the revenue the said Stephen Ford was to be given necessary food and raiment (Clothing). Pendleton, Shapleigh, Rishworth and Babb were called the "Fishing Masters" of the Isles. Pendleton was a prominent official and merchant as were Shapleigh and Rishworth. Apparently a "Fishing Master" had to have enough money to own his expensive fish drying stage and to have enough influence as a merchant to do buying and selling and exporting of the dried fish, called "dunfish." By 1660 Ford had become well enough to become a "Fishing Master" himself. (4 - p. 39, 71, 240) (York Deeds, Bk 1, fol. 58)

Finally in 1661 as a result of a third petition, the Massachusetts Court approved that the Isles of Shoals be made the Township of Appledore, giving the group equal power to regulate their town affairs as other towns in Massachusetts. The name "Appledore" came from the name of an ancient fishing hamlet in North Devon which was used as a port by merchants engaged in trade and fisheries with the New World². The Isles were later divided up by Massachusetts and New Hampshire, and the township was dissolved in 1682. When Maine became a state, the islands belonging to Massachusetts became part of Maine. The name "Appledore" remained with the Isles as a replacement name for "Hog" Island⁶ where Phillip Babb had lived.

Phillip's Isles of Shoals Family

We know that Phillip's wife was Mary because in 1668 Roger Kelly was bonded for abusive carriages towards Mr. Babb and his wife; and in 1671 Lawrence Carpenter was bonded for cruel usage of Mary Babb's servant. However, no record has been found of Phillip's marriage.

Regarding his Isles of Shoals family, there may have been other children who died young, but we know of only five sons of the couple, and know the exact age of only one. We have assumed the order of the sons from later activities, and assume that they were at least two years apart in age. Since Mary died by 1674 - soon after Phillip - the children were apparently put in the custody of several families on the mainland.

Apparently, Phillip Babb died in early 1671 without leaving a will. At a Court held at York on 4 July 1671, Letters of Administration were granted to Mr. Nathaniel Fryer, and he was empowered to bring in a true Inventory of the estate to the next Court of Associates. (Maine Province and Court Records, Vol. 4, p. 105) An inventory was appraised and valued by William Sealy, John Fabes, and Edward Fetterly the 31 of March and first of August 1671:

The Myth

From the mention of various adjacent rooms to the dwelling house and warehouse, it is believed that Phillip had a form of tavern for fishermen, although he certainly had little in the way of cookware and serving dishes even for his own family. Also, because of the various animals listed on the inventory, it is believed that he was a butcher, although the inventory does not mention a butcher shop as such.

We find that in addition to being a constable, a local magistrate, a fishing master, and a possible tavern keeper and butcher. Phillip has also been called "The Ghost of the Isles of Shoals" and especially fanciful descriptions of this are found in various books about the Isles. For posterity a cove on Appledore was named Babb's Cove. However, in 1908 the U. S. Coast Guard built a boat house on the edge of the cove, covering what some have romantically surmised was Phillip's treasure. Phillip's larger than life personality has led to a number of Legends about him, not all of which could be true. But some are undoubtedly accurate.

Since his mother died by 1674, he must have been taken in by one of the local families and apprenticed, but no records prove it.

Apparently, William and brother Thomas planned to "Go South" after they came of age, and they were on the tax list of Constable Philip English of Salem, MA, on 16 Apr 1683, for two shillings each ("History of Salem, Massachusetts" by Sidney Perley, Vol. 3, p 419). Also, the books of Philip English, who was a Salem merchant, have a charge against William Babb & Co. (Thomas Babb) "To goods sold them to carry to the Southward." The account runs to 1684 ("Genealogical Dictionary of Maine and New Hampshire" by Sybil Noyes, Charles T. Libby, and Walter G. Davis, p. 71).

We have no proof that William and Deborah had any children. William died before he could "go South," and Deborah was named his executrix on 30 Jun 1691 in Essex County MA Probate Records. His inventory was taken 20 Feb 1690/1 and the value was 4 pounds 17 shillings (Essex Co., MA, Probate records 1690/1).

NH Court Records Vol. 5, p. 15, dtd 24 Jun 1676, Joseph Hall petitioned the court for recompense for maintaining for two years Peter Babb, son of Philip Babb, the father and mother both being dead, and the child five years old next Michaelmas. The court on 27 Jun 1676 bound Peter Babb as an apprentice to Joseph Hall until he reached the age of 21 years (2) In 1696 Peter leased the Hall farm, but a year later he was living in John Westbrook's house near the great swamp ("Gen Dict. of ME & NH" by N/L/D).

In 1693 Peter and brother Sampson did not appear with their arms for the militia and were fined 5 shillings each (Provo Papers of NH, Vol. 2, p. 106). Also in Nov 1693 Peter and Sampson had seats in the men's side gallery in the meetinghouse (NH GR Vol. 3, p. 172). In 1698 Peter was named on the Greenland section of the Portsmouth tax list swamp ("Gen Dict. of ME & NH" by N/L/D). Note that for land record purposes Greenland was part of Portsmouth at this time, but for religious purposes it had a separate church.

In Court Case #17,934, Thomas Parker (possibly Packer) on 9 Sep 1697 was complainant against Peter Babb, principal, John Brim, and Hugh Banfield for supposedly by force of arms violently taking away his goods and boards. Peter testified that he was a poor man with nothing to maintain his family on but what he got by hard labor; that in the past winter he had gotten ready a parcell of logs; that he had taken about four feet of logs to Mr. Parker's mill to be sawn, and when he went back several times to try to get his portion of the boards, Parker said he

should get no boards and no money. Peter picked up one of the boards of the portion due him, and Parker took hold of the other end and shook him several times and tore his neckcloth. They exchanged many angry words with each accusing the other of pushing and shoving (NH Archives, Provincial Probate Records).

In another Court Case #17,961, showing further anger between Peter and Thomas, Peter Babb of Portsmouth was accused on 3 Dec 1697 by Thomas Parker of "taking away a sow of sd farm of sd Parker by drawing her after him by giving of ye sow corn or som graine." Peter, about 26 years old, testified that he never did so do. Elizabeth Babb of about 23 years also testified (NH Archives, Provincial Probate Records). [She may have been the first wife of brother Sampson.]

On 1 Jun 1702 Peter Babb, husband of Sarah Cate, released all right to the estate of James Cate (Provo Papers of NH, Vol. 31, p. 203).

On 15 Feb 1704/5 Peter Babb, laborer of Portsmouth, and his wife Sarah, sold 13 acres in Great Bay area to John Fakens (possibly Fabyan) for b22 and 15 shillings (Rockingham Co., NH Deeds Vol. 14, p. 132). Peter signed a common lands deed 2 Apr 1711 (NEHGR Vol. 51, pp. 44-46).

The record was incorrectly indexed under Huffty as the person who wrote the index was not familiar with the 16th Century writing style where an S resembles a modern day F

Below is a discussion of Christopher's life as chronicled in the *Genealogical Dictionary of Maine and New Hampshire, 1988*.

LDS Microfilm 029,883 part 3 has a seven page Hussey genealogy based on Austin and 160 Allied Families by John Osborne Austin, 1893, History of Nantucket by Alexander Starbuck, 1924, and History of Lynn, Mass., by Alonzo Lewis and James R. Newhall, 1865. It tells of Christopher Hussey, his wife, mother, and father-in-law first coming to New England. It tells of Christopher holding many offices and being a substantial land owner.

An interesting entry is that 1659, 7, 2, Christopher was one of the nine purchasers of Nantucket,

Mass., from Thomas Mayhew, for 30 pounds sterling and two beaver hats; "one for myself and one for my wife", as the deed says. It is not known that he ever went to that island; he certainly never lived there for any considerable time.

1671, 10, 23. Captain Christopher Hussey of Hampton, deeded to his sons Stephen and John of same place, for 80 pounds, all his interest on the Island of Nantucket, "that is to say all my lands, arable land, pasture, meadows, woodland, all commonage, rights and privileges due unto me according to the purchase made by me; with all my cattle, neat cattle, goats or horses, all my stock that is on the island of Nantucket of what kind or quality or ever it be".

Inventory, upwards 600 pounds including the following items: House, orchard and land adjoining, 42 pounds. Upland on the farm, 200 pounds. Five acres meadow, 100 pounds. 40 acres marsh, 60 pounds. 15 acres marsh, 24 pounds. Planting land, 28 pounds. Spring meadow, 30 pounds. 7 acre meadow, 14 pounds. Meadow, 6 pounds. Spring meadow, 30 pounds. 7 acres meadow, 14 pounds. Meadow, 6 pounds. Land at North Division, 6 pounds. 4 shares Ox Common, 24 pounds. 4 shares Cow Commons, 30 pounds. 12 acres pasture, 20 pounds. 3 cows, 1 ox and 1 year old beast, 12 pounds.
